Who are the children in prison today?

• There were concerns relating to suicide or self-harm (31%), physical health (30%), mental health (33%), learning disabilities or difficulties (32%) for around one third of children sent to custody between April 2014 and March 2016.



Children in prison today – at risk

- The number of children entering custody has decreased by two-thirds in the last decade
- The average length of sentence is increasing
- Self harm rates and restraints of children in prison are increasing
- 35 children have died in prison since 1990
- Over 1000 allegations of child sexual abuse between 2007 – 2016 (IICSA, 2019)




Life inside with Covid-19 - children

- "I'm worried because I got grandparents I'm worried about what will happen to them."
- The regime in prisons has been severely restricted
- Most children in prolonged solitary confinement.
- No face to face visits, no face to face education in the majority of establishments and no therapy.
- Difficulties in accessing the support they need to plan for release.
- Safeguards reduced.

Key points

- The Howard League's legal work with children in custody provides an insight into the difficulties they face. The team operates a unique front-line legal service for young people aged 21 and under in custody.
- Evidence from a host of independent sources shows that custody can be harmful and difficult for children in ordinary times. Many children in prison report that they do not feet safe. Around half of all children in prison come from black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) backgrounds. Between a third and half of children in custody report having been in the care of their local authority.
- The Howard League's legal work and contact with children during the Covid-19 pandemic shows that this is a particularly difficult time for children in custody.



Life inside with Covid-19 – young adults

- Growing consensus- young adults in the criminal justice system have distinct characteristics and needs - still developing neurologically up to the age of 25 and have a high prevalence of atypical brain development.
- They have not provided us with anything to wash hands, no cell cleaner.
- They are making everything 10 times worse. They get us up at 7.45 in the morning, but you don't sleep properly anyway, your 25 mins out of cell start from them shouting you awake, not when you get to the social room, it doesn't leave enough time for shower and to get outside. The day drags out.








Life inside Covid-19 - adults

"The current conditions in prisons represent a factor which can properly be taken into account in deciding whether to suspend a sentence. In accordance with established principles, any court will take into account the likely impact of a custodial sentence upon an offender and, where appropriate, upon others as well. Judges and magistrates can, therefore, and in our judgment should, keep in mind that the impact of a custodial sentence is likely to be heavier during the current emergency than it would otherwise be. Those in custody are, for example, confined to their cells for much longer periods than would otherwise be the case –currently, 23 hours a day. They are unable to receive visits. Both they and their families are likely to be anxious about the risk of the transmission of Covid-19" (paragraph 41).)
